DEVOTIONS THROUGH THE BOOK OF DANIEL



"Blessed be the name of God forever and ever, to whom belongs wisdom and might. He changes times and seasons; He removes kings and sets up kings; He gives wisdom to the wise and knowledge to those who have understanding; He reveals deep and hidden things; He knows what is in the darkness, and the light dwells with Him."

-The Prophet Daniel, in Daniel 2:20-22

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DANIEL AND THE LIFE OF CHRIST (DANIEL 1-12)

Daniel is a figure in the Old Testament who serves as a great example of faithfulness, wisdom, and courage in the face of persecution. As a prophet and advisor to kings, Daniel lived a life that was characterized by a deep devotion to God and a willingness to put his faith into action. He faced incredible challenges, including being thrown into a lion's den, but always remained steadfast.

Daniel's life points forward to Jesus in several significant ways. First, Daniel's unwavering faithfulness to God (Dan. 1:8; 6:5) is a powerful anticipation of the sinless, perfect faithfulness that Jesus on our behalf exemplified throughout his own life. Second, Daniel acknowledged that the wisdom and guidance he gave to the kings of his day came from God (Dan. 2:27-28), and this is a reminder of the wisdom and guidance that Jesus gives to us through His teachings about living as citizens of the Kingdom of God. Third, Daniel's courage in the face of persecution (Dan. 6:10-12) is a powerful reminder of the bravery that Jesus demonstrated in the face of his own suffering and death on the cross, which He suffered in our place, on our behalf, for our sins.

As we study Daniel and reflect on the way his life points forward to Jesus, we are encouraged to follow his footsteps and embody the same qualities. We are called to remain steadfast, even in the face of trials, and to always put our trust of God into action. We are also called to be wise, and to share the good news of the Gospel with the world around us.

GOD'S FAITHFULNESS IN DIFFICULTIES (DANIEL 1-12)

The book of Daniel is a powerful reminder of God's faithfulness. Through the experiences of Daniel and his friends, we see how God is always in control, even when things might appear hopeless to us.

One of the accounts in Daniel is of three men who were thrown into a furnace for refusing to worship Nebuchadnezzar's idol. But the king was shocked to see them unscathed by the flames. We too can have confidence in God's protection in the midst of adversity. Daniel 6:23 reminds us, "My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions... because I was innocent in his sight."

Another theme that is tied in with God's faithfulness is the idea of God's kingdom being superior to earthly kingdoms. God is able to faithfully carry out His promises because He is a King whose heavenly Kingdom has no rival. Throughout, we see God bringing down the pride of kings, and elevating the faithful. In Daniel 2:44 we are told that "In the time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed, nor left to another people. It will crush all these kingdoms and bring them to an end, but it will endure forever."

The message of Daniel is comforting, reminding us that no matter what, God is faithful, and He is always in control, and His kingdom will triumph. We can trust His protection and have confidence in His plan. May we follow the example of Daniel and his friends, and remain faithful in our trust and devotion to God, no matter the challenges that we face.

DANIEL'S PROPHETIC WITNESS TO CHRIST (DANIEL 1-12)

The power of prophecy is one of the signature elements of the Book of Daniel.

In these twelve chapters, we see Daniel's prophetic visions and the way that they point forward to the coming of Jesus and the establishment of His Kingdom. For example, the vision of the four beasts (Daniel 7:2-7) is a clear reference to the kingdoms of this world that will eventually be defeated and replaced by the Kingdom of God through the arrival of Jesus Christ. This vision not only points to the eventual triumph of God's Kingdom, but it also serves as a warning to all the earthly kingdoms that would seek to elevate themselves above God.

Similarly, the vision of the seventy weeks (Daniel 9:24-27) is a powerful prophecy that speaks of the arrival of the Messiah and the establishment of his Kingdom. Through this vision, Daniel foretells the time and manner of Jesus' arrival and the events that will accompany His coming. In doing so, he offers a clear and compelling testimony to the power and sovereignty of God, and the certainty of His plans.

Throughout his visions and interpretations, from the dream of a stone not cut by human hands (Dan. 2:34, 44), to the vision of One like a Son of Man (Dan. 7:13-14), and beyond, Daniel prophetically points forward to the Kingdom of Jesus, reminding us of the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom and the certainty of his plans for the world. As we read the book of Daniel, may we be inspired and encouraged to remain steadfast in our faith, knowing that the Kingdom of Jesus is drawing ever near.

FOR HIS PURPOSE AND HIS GLORY (DANIEL 1:1-7)

In this passage, we see how the people of Judah were taken to Babylon, with Daniel and his friends captured along with other young Jews of the royal family and nobility. Here we begin to see the purpose that God had for these young men, and the rest of the people of Judah, during that time of captivity.

God had a plan for Judah in Babylon. He used the Babylonian empire to discipline His people, but He also used their time of exile as a platform to display His own power and grace. Despite the difficulties that Judah faced, God remained faithful to His promises and used their time in captivity to refine and strengthen their faith.

In this passage, we see that God's purpose for Israel was to bring glory to His name and to show His power to the nations. Through their time of exile in a foreign land, God used the Jews to demonstrate His sovereignty and grace. God's purpose for them was not just to punish them but to use their circumstances to bring about His good purposes.

Today we can trust that God has a purpose for us in every situation we face. Whether we are facing trials or difficulties, or experiencing prosperity and success, we can trust that God is at work in our lives to bring about His good purposes. FAITHFULNESS AMIDST CULTURAL PRESSURE (DANIEL 1:8-16)

Daniel 1:8-16 shows us the incredible consistency of Daniel and his three friends, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah, despite the cultural pressure they faced. As captives in Babylon, they were forced to assimilate to the ways of their captors, including the consumption of forbidden food and drink.

However, Daniel and his friends refused to compromise their faith and made a bold decision to remain faithful to God despite the pressure they faced. They asked the head of the palace guard for permission to eat only vegetables and drink only water, and God graciously blessed them with good health and wisdom.

The account of Daniel and his friends is a powerful reminder of the importance of remaining faithful to God despite cultural pressure. In a world that is constantly trying to pull us away from our faith and beliefs, it can be difficult to stay committed to God and His ways. (DANIEL 1:17-21)

In Daniel 1:17-21, we see a great example of striving to grow in excellence, even in the midst of difficult circumstances. The young men of Israel were taken into captivity and placed in the king's palace to be trained for government service. Despite being placed in an environment where they were surrounded by idol worship and the temptations of the king's table, they stood firm in their faith and commitment to God.

These young men didn't simply coast by and do the bare minimum; they strived for excellence in all that they did. They applied themselves to their studies, taking advantage of every opportunity to learn and grow.

This same principle applies to us as believers today. We too are called to strive for excellence, not only in our careers and education, but in every area of our lives. We should not be content with mediocrity, but instead, we should aim to work as if it were for God, and be the best that we can be in all that we do.

We can do this by dedicating ourselves to prayer and seeking God's wisdom and guidance. We can also make the most of our opportunities, putting in the extra effort to learn and grow in our knowledge and understanding. And, like Daniel, we must be willing to stand firm in our faith and make choices that honor God, even when it is difficult.

GODLY VS. UNGODLY ANGER (DANIEL 2:1-16)

Daniel 2:1-16 tells us about the anger of King Nebuchadnezzar and how it affected the lives of the Israelites living in Babylon. The king was furious because no one could interpret his dream, and he ordered all the wise men to be executed. But through God's wisdom, Daniel was able to interpret the dream and reveal the king's true anger as a result of his pride and arrogance.

There are two kinds of anger. Godly anger is a powerful emotion, which was also experienced by Jesus (Mark 3:5), and it is used for good. It is a response to injustice, cruelty, or wrong-doing. This anger motivates us to work towards making things right and restoring what has been broken.

Ungodly anger, on the other hand, is fueled by self-centeredness, pride, and a lack of self-control. This anger is often directed towards others and leads to destructive behavior. It can cause harm to those around us and damage relationships.

In this story, King Nebuchadnezzar's anger was ungodly. This type of anger can lead to great harm, just as it did for the wise men in Babylon. But Daniel shows us how God's wisdom can be used to deal with ungodly anger. Daniel's humility and faith allowed him to interpret the king's dream and bring peace. It is important for us to recognize the difference between godly and ungodly anger. Godly anger should motivate us to bring about restoration, while ungodly anger should be recognized as a warning sign, so that we can seek guidance from God.

BEING A GOOD INFLUENCE (DANIEL 2:17-30)

In Daniel 2:17-30, we see the story of Arioch, the captain of the king's guard, who was tasked with finding someone who could interpret the king's dream. As he was about to kill all the wise men in the kingdom, he was stopped by Daniel who offered to help the king.

As Christians, we can learn from Daniel's example of being a good influence to those around us, even those in positions of power. We are called to be the light in the darkness, shining forth the love and grace of Christ to all those we encounter.

Just like Daniel, we can be the voice of reason, offering guidance and wisdom to those who may be lost or in need. We can be the ones who point them in the right direction, showing them the truth and helping them make better decisions. We can also offer comfort and encouragement, providing a safe haven where they can find peace and rest.

THE KINGDOM OF CHRIST (DANIEL 2:31-49)

In Daniel 2:31-49, we see King Nebuchadnezzar's dream of a great statue, with a head of gold, arms of silver, stomach and thighs of bronze, legs of iron, and feet of iron mixed with clay. This statue represents different kingdoms that would rule the world throughout history. However, the dream continues with a rock, cut without human hands, destroying the statue and filling the earth.

This rock represents the kingdom of Christ, and the good news of his kingdom is that it will be everlasting and unshakable. No matter how much the world may change or what kingdoms may rise and fall, the kingdom of Christ will endure forever.

The dream also shows that the kingdom of Christ will come to rule the whole earth, filling it completely. This means that one day, all people will be under the rule and reign of Christ, and that his kingdom will bring peace, joy, and righteousness to all people.

In verses 44-45, we see that the kingdom of Christ will be established by God himself and that it will never be destroyed. This means that we can have complete trust and confidence in the kingdom of Christ, knowing that it will endure forever.

Second, there was a significant and overwhelming punishment in store for any individual or group who refused to conform along with everybody else (Dan. 3:6). Third, the action that was being demanded was public in nature, so anyone who did not conform would feel the disapproval and criticism of others (Dan. 3:7).

Conformity is a seductive force that can be hard to resist. It is easy to follow the crowd, to do what everyone else is doing, and to adopt the beliefs and values of the culture around us. But as this account shows, this kind of conformity can threaten to lead us away from our faith and our ability to discern right from wrong. It can lead us to compromise our beliefs, our values, and our morality in order to fit in with the crowd.

In our own lives, we too may face pressure to conform. We may be tempted to give in, to compromise. But we must be steadfast in our commitment to our faith. We must be courageous, willing to stand up for what is right, even if it means going against the grain.

(DANIEL 3:8-23)

In Daniel 3:8-23, we see the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego who refused to bow down to the statue that King Nebuchadnezzar had set up. Despite the threat of death in a blazing furnace, these three friends kept their eyes firmly fixed on heavenly things, and remained steadfast in their faith in God and held fast to their commitment to honor Him.

In today's world, it can be easy to get caught up in the things of this earth and to forget our true focus. We can be distracted by the seemingly urgent and important things of this world, and lose sight of God. But we must remember that our ultimate goal is to be heavenly-minded.

Being heavenly-minded means having a perspective that is focused on God and the things of heaven, not just on the immediate concerns of this earth. It means having a heart that is set on serving God above all else and seeking His will. This is the same perspective that Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego had.

The Bible says in Colossians 3:2, "Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things." This means that we must choose to focus on God's kingdom and not the kingdom of this world. We must choose to seek God's will in all things and to prioritize His will above everything else.

In order to be heavenly-minded, we must put God first. Let us strive to have a heart that is set on serving Him and to live a life that honors Him in all things. May we always remember that our ultimate goal is to be with Him in heaven, where we will live with Him forever.

JESUS IS WITH YOU IN THE FIRE (DANIEL 3:24-30)

Here we see the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego who refused to bow down to the king's idol and were thrown into the fiery furnace as punishment. However, we see that not only did they survive the fiery furnace, but they were also joined by a fourth person in the fire who looked like the Son of God. This person is none other than Jesus Himself, who was with them in their time of trial.

Just like Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, we too will face trials and temptations in our lives. But, just like Jesus was with them in the fire, He is also with us in our trials. He is our comforter and our savior, who will never leave us nor forsake us. When we are going through difficult times, it can be easy to feel like we are all alone, but the truth is that Jesus is always there with us. He is our strength and our refuge, and He will carry us through any trial that comes our way.

The key to remember in times of trial is to trust in Jesus. When we trust in him, we can have peace in the midst of chaos, and joy in the midst of sorrow. We can be confident that He will be with us, guiding us and strengthening us every step of the way. Jesus is with us in good or hard times; He is with us through blessing and even in the midst of the fire.

So, when you are going through a difficult time, remember that Jesus is with you. He loves you and will never leave you. Trust in Him and have faith that he will bring you through your trial. With Jesus by our side, we can overcome anything that comes our way.

SEEKING GODLY COUNSEL (DANIEL 4:1-27)

In this passage from the book of Daniel, King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon learns a valuable lesson about seeking wise counsel. In chapter 4:1-27, he has a dream that troubles him and he calls upon the wise men of Babylon to interpret it. Despite their efforts, they are unable to give a satisfactory explanation. It is only when the prophet Daniel is summoned that the dream is finally understood.

Daniel's interpretation of the dream reveals that the king will be humbled and will live like a wild animal for seven years as punishment for his pride and arrogance. The dream comes true, and King Nebuchadnezzar eventually acknowledges the power of the Most High God.

This passage teaches us that it is crucial to seek good advice, especially when we are facing difficult decisions or circumstances. Like King Nebuchadnezzar, we can benefit greatly from the wisdom and experience of godly counselors like Daniel who will lovingly tell us the truth when we need to hear it.

To seek good advice, start surrounding yourself now with wise and trustworthy brothers and sisters in Christ. Be humble and open-minded. In order to receive wise counsel, we must be willing to listen and consider the advice of others, even if it goes against what we want to do. Doing these things will ensure that we not only receive guidance, but that we also have the ability to hear and act on it.

THE LESSON OF HUMILITY (DANIEL 4:28-33)

King Nebuchadnezzar was a ruler who had everything a king could want. He was wealthy, powerful, and feared by many. However, despite his success and power, King Nebuchadnezzar was not content. He became prideful and boastful, thinking that he was responsible for all of his accomplishments.

One day, God humbled King Nebuchadnezzar by causing him to lose his mind and live like an animal for seven years. In Daniel 4:28-33, we see that King Nebuchadnezzar finally recognizes his pride and acknowledges that all power and might belongs to God alone. He says, "All the peoples of the earth are considered as nothing. He does as he pleases with the powers of heaven and the peoples of the earth. No one can hold back his hand or say to him: 'What have you done?'"

This story serves as a reminder that we too must be humble in all things. We must recognize that everything we have and everything we are is a gift from God. We cannot take credit for our accomplishments and must always give him the glory. When we are humble, we are more open to the wisdom of God, and we become more willing to serve others.

Being humbled can be difficult, but it is necessary for our growth. When we are proud and boastful, we block the path of God in our lives. However, when we humble ourselves, we open our hearts to the Lord, and He begins to transform us into the person He created us to be.

A GOOD TESTIMONY (DANIEL 4:34-37)

Daniel 4:34-37 tells the story of King Nebuchadnezzar who, after experiencing a vision of the Lord, gave his detailed testimony of the power and sovereignty of God. The king realized that he was but a small piece in the grand plan of God and that all of his earthly power and glory was nothing compared to the greatness of the Lord. This realization led the king to praise and glorify God, acknowledging His sovereignty over all.

In the same way, we too can give testimony of our encounter with Christ. When we come to the realization that Jesus is Lord and Savior, our lives are transformed and we can no longer deny the power of God. TEMPORARY KINGDOMS (DANIEL 7:1-8)

The vision of the kingdoms of the earth, seen by the prophet Daniel in the book of Daniel 7:1-8, is a remarkable depiction of the history of nations and empires. In this vision, Daniel saw four great beasts rising out of the sea, each of them representing a different kingdom that would rule over the earth.

The first beast was like a lion with wings, symbolizing Babylon, a powerful kingdom that ruled with strength and might. The second beast was like a bear, representing the Medo-Persian empire, known for its power and domination. The third beast was like a leopard with four wings, representing Greece, a kingdom that conquered many lands through its swiftness and cunning.

May we be filled with the hope and peace that comes from knowing that the kingdom of God will endure forever, and may we be faithful servants of its King, Jesus Christ.

JESUS, THE SON OF MAN (DANIEL 7:9-14)

The book of Daniel is a prophetic book that foretells the coming of the Messiah. In chapter 7, Daniel sees a vision of four beasts that represent the world's great empires. However, in verse 13, he sees a figure like a son of man coming on the clouds of heaven with the authority to rule over all nations.

(DANIEL 7:15-28)

In the vision, a terrifying beast rose up, but was then destroyed, and the kingdom was given to the people of the Most High. But Daniel did not know what all of these things meant, and he felt alarmed (Dan. 7:28).

So, if you're feeling anxious today, turn to the Lord and trust in His sovereignty. Remind yourself that He is in control and that He will work all things for your good. Take your anxieties to Him in prayer and ask for His peace to fill you.

God is in control, and we can trust Him with our anxieties. When we surrender our worries to Him, we can find peace in knowing that He is always on the throne and working all things for good.

So, let us trust in the Lord and find comfort in him.

DON'T PUT YOUR HOPE IN POLITICS (DANIEL 8:1-14)

In the book of Daniel, chapter 8, we see a powerful dream that was given to Daniel by God. This dream depicted a political leader, who rose to power and oppressed the people of God. The leader was depicted as a mighty ram with two horns, who conquered many nations before a goat appeared, who defeated the ram and became the ruler of the world—and yet this did not result in deliverance for God's people.

The dream is a powerful reminder of the emptiness of politics and the dangers of placing our trust in earthly leaders. It is a warning against putting our faith in the things of this world, instead of seeking the guidance and wisdom of God.

Politics, just like any other aspect of this world, is fleeting and constantly changing. We cannot put our trust in the things of this world, as they will inevitably disappoint us. Only God is constant and unchanging, and it is only in Him that we can find true peace and security.

In our modern world, it is easy to become distracted and caught up in the latest political news and events. We often find ourselves putting our trust in political leaders and systems, hoping that they will bring about the change that we desire. But this is a dangerous path, as it leads us away from the truth and the guidance of God. Instead, we must turn to God and seek His wisdom and guidance in all things. We must put our trust in Him alone and seek to live our lives according to His will. Only then will we find true peace and security, knowing that we are in the hands of a loving and faithful God.

SEEKING WISDOM FROM GOD (DANIEL 8:15-17)

Daniel 8:15-17 describes the appearance of the angel Gabriel to Daniel, who was seeking wisdom and understanding from God. In these verses, Gabriel reveals to Daniel that he was sent to explain the vision he had been given. This passage is a powerful reminder of God's commitment to providing us with wisdom and understanding, even when the path ahead may seem unclear.

In our own pursuit of wisdom and understanding, we must be patient and persistent. We may not receive answers right away, but if we continue to seek God with a humble heart, He will eventually reveal His truth to us. And just like Gabriel, He may use unexpected means to do so.

GOD IS CAPABLE OF RESCUE (DANIEL 8:18-27)

As we read through the book of Daniel, we see how the people of God faced numerous challenges and seemingly hopeless situations. However, in every instance, God came to their rescue and delivered them from their afflictions. But they could not do what had been asked of them—it was beyond them!

The Lord is always ready to help us, if we will only turn to Him and ask. He has already given us the answers to our problems in His Word, which is the Bible. We must study it, meditate on it, and apply its teachings to our lives. He will lead us to the answers that the world can not provide to us—answers that bring peace, joy, and fulfillment.

DON'T TAKE THINGS FOR GRANTED (DANIEL 5:13-30)

In the book of Daniel, we read about King Belshazzar and how he threw a great feast. In the midst of the revelry, a hand appeared and wrote on the wall. The writing was a warning to him that his kingdom was about to be divided and taken away from him. The words "Mene, Mene, Tekel, Upharsin" meant that God had measured Belshazzar's reign and found it lacking, that he had been weighed in the balance and found wanting, and that his kingdom would be divided and given to the Medes and Persians.

And that very night, his reign ended.

So let us be inspired by the story of the Maccabees, and let us stand firm in our faith, fighting for what is right with courage and determination. For in the end, we will see that God will work wonders through those who are faithful and willing to stand up for their beliefs.

HOPE IN CHRIST (DANIEL 11:36-12:4)

Here, we see a prophecy of the end-times, and the fulfillment of God's plan for humanity. In Daniel 11:36-12:4, we are told of the rise of a powerful ruler who will defile the temple and persecute the people of God. This ruler will cause much distress and suffering for God's people, but despite all the chaos and turmoil, there is a message of hope in Christ.

In Daniel 12:1-2, we read, "There will be a time of distress such as has not happened from the beginning of nations until then. But at that time your people—everyone whose name is found written in the book—will be delivered. Multitudes who sleep in the dust of the earth will awake: some to everlasting life, others to shame and everlasting contempt."

This passage speaks of the ultimate victory of God's people and the hope we have in the resurrection of the dead and the renewal of all things in Christ. The shroud of end-times fulfillment serves as a reminder that despite the challenges and hardships we may face in this world, our ultimate hope is in the return of Jesus Christ and the establishment of his kingdom.

So, as we navigate the uncertainty and turmoil of our time, let us hold fast to the hope that is in Christ. Let us trust in the promise of his return and the ultimate fulfillment of His plan for humanity. Let us seek to live lives that reflect the hope that we have and share the message of salvation with those around us. For, in Christ, we have a hope that transcends this world and endures forever.

(DANIEL 12:5-8)

In a world that is constantly on the go, it can be difficult to slow down and wait for things to unfold. We often find ourselves caught up in our own plans, desires and goals, and we become frustrated and anxious when things don't go according to our timeline. But as Christians, we are called to trust in the Lord and be patient in all things.

Daniel 12:5-8 reminds us that there will be a time of waiting, and this waiting is not in vain. The Scripture says, "'How long shall it be till the end of these wonders?'... for a time, times, and half a time... I heard this, but I did not understand."

There is a time and a purpose for everything. Even though we may not understand why things are happening, or why they are taking so long, we must trust that God has a plan and that everything will fall into place in due time. It's not for us to know the timeline, but to trust that God will fulfill His promises in His own perfect timing.

So how can we cultivate patience in our own lives? First, we must pray for the Holy Spirit to fill us with his peace. We must also focus on God's character and trust in His goodness. And lastly, we must be thankful, knowing that God is working all things together for our good.

As we wait for God's promises to be fulfilled, let us be patient, trust in the Lord, and remember that there is a time and a purpose for everything.

KEEP YOUR FOCUS ON GOD (DANIEL 12:8-9)

In the book of Daniel, we see the prophet Daniel being told about a time of great trouble, a time when many will be persecuted and tested. But in the midst of all this, there is a message of hope. In verses 8-9 of chapter 12, we read, "Although I heard, I did not understand. Then I said, 'My lord, what will be the outcome of these things?' He said, 'Go your way, Daniel, for the words are concealed and sealed up until the end time."

This passage reminds us that there are many things in life that we may not understand or have answers for. We may become overwhelmed and caught up in the details of our struggles and worries. But in these moments, it's important for us to focus on God and trust in His plan for our lives.

When we focus on God, we are reminded that He is in control, and that He has a purpose for everything that happens in our lives. We can trust that He is working everything out for our good and for His glory, even when it may not seem like it. (DANIEL 12:9-13)

This passage is a powerful reminder that our ultimate goal as Christians should be to live a life that is pleasing to the Lord and to remain steadfast in our faith even in the face of trials and temptations.

We must be willing to sacrifice our own selfish ambitions and sometimes even the approval of other people for the sake of Christ, just as He gave His life for us. This is what it means to be faithful, to walk in obedience to God's commands, to trust in His promises, and to live in the power of His Spirit.

It's easy to become distracted by the things of this world, but we must remain steadfast and focus on the prize that awaits us in heaven. We must hold on to our faith in Jesus, knowing that He is our source of strength, wisdom, and guidance. We must rely on Him to help us overcome temptations, to comfort us in times of trial, and to sustain us through every difficulty.

Living for Jesus faithfully is not always easy, but it is worth it. Our reward will be great, and we will be able to stand with confidence before our Lord and Savior. So let us strive to live for Him every day, in all things, and in all ways, knowing that He is always faithful to us.
